Thoughts

Historians will probably call our era "the age of anxiety." Anxiety is the natural result when our hopes are centred in anything short of God and His will for us (Billy Graham May 1965)

When Billy Graham wrote those words in 1965, no one knew how true they would be in 2020.

At its best, anxiety distracts us from our relationship with God and the truth that He is "Lord of heaven and earth" (Matthew 11:25). At its worst, anxiety is a crippling disease, taking over our minds and plunging our thoughts into darkness.

But God wants so much more for us than to walk through life full of fear, worry and anxiety.

"Do not be anxious about anything," the Bible tells us in the book of Philippians, Chapter 4, "but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

Our instructions do not stop there- the chapter goes on to tell believers exactly what we should focus on.

And it is **not** fear, terrorism, illness, death or evil.



["]Finally, brothers, whatever is **true**, whatever is **honourable**, whatever is **just**, whatever is **pure**, whatever is **lovely**, whatever is **commendable**, if there is any **excellence**, if there is **anything worthy of praise**, **think about these things**. What you have learned and received and heard and seen in me - **practice these things**, **and the God of peace will be with you**" (Philippians 4:8-9, ESV, emphasis added).

The first step to an anxiety-free mind is to **give your life to Jesus Christ**. Once you have taken that step, it is important to fix your thoughts on Jesus and the promise that He is preparing a place for His followers in heaven (John 14:2-3).

April 23rd - William Shakespeare's Birthday perhaps (also the day upon which he died) - we know quite a lot about him! We know a bit about St George too, - but not a lot really! Then there's George's dragon – he is a different kettle of fish - that dragon really is a bad lad! We can hone up on him in the Bible where he gets lots of mentions, but none of them good!

There is a sound description of a dragon in Job 41, but nowadays we use the word "LEVIATHAN". It appears that a dragon or a sea monster is being described here, but over time translators have left us with a depiction that leads us to believe the animal is what now we call a dragon.

In Job v31-34 (NIV) the creature is portrayed thus: "Nothing on earth is his equal - a creature without fear. He looks down on all that are haughty; he is king over all that are proud." There was nothing else on earth like the dragon - God made him mightier, stronger and fiercer than anything, including man. But God used Leviathan to remind us that there is no one else like Himself - there is only one God (Isaiah 45:6) and He is all powerful. It is He who makes the sick, the lame, the blind and the deaf (and heals them). There is no one else who can do that, and there is only one God who can kill the powerful, evil and feared Leviathan (Psalm 74:14).

Take a look in John's Revelations:

Revelations12 vs 3, 4, 7, 9 / Revelations13 vs 1, 2, 4, 11, 13 / Revelations 16:13 and 20:2.

There was nothing else on earth like the dragon - God made him mightier, stronger and fiercer than anything, including man. Revelations tells us the dragon is the devil or Satan. The dragon appears to symbolize power, but God conquers with His Almighty, unsurpassed power (Revelation 20:2).

Satan is called a dragon in the book of Revelation. He is described as an evil angel (Ezekiel 28:14), a created being – a cherub who used to live in heaven with God. In Revelations the term dragon is another name for Satan and it is also symbolic of Satan's real power. Satan and Leviathan are powerful beings. Satan is a created, powerful angel who turned to evil and was then removed from Heaven and roams amongst us now. Leviathan Dragon is a

However, our Scriptures reminds us that God is greater than any spiritual or physical being.

Job, understandably in my opinion, had been complaining about God and so God asked Job, "Why do you talk so much when you know so little?" (Job 38 vs 2 + 3)

Centuries before Hand, Job already knew the answer - and now, even centuries later, we still know the answer - *there is nothing like God on earth, in heaven or anywhere else - Glory to God!*
