Covid-19 is not God's Judgement

How we can know God isn't acting now as he acted against Pharaoh?

Is the coronavirus a judgment from God?

Will the world be judged with pestilence?

It's easy to quote the Bible in support of such questions.

In Old Testament times there are examples of diseases inflicted on peoples in supernatural ways.

When God sent boils on Egypt, they broke out instantly "on man and beast" throughout the land.

The pestilence of Revelation will come by one of the "four horsemen of the apocalypse," not a wet market in Wuhan.

However, we are not living in those days.

Everything scientists can tell us about COVID-19 is that the virus evolved from other viruses.

It natural, not supernatural.

God did not cause or command this virus or the pandemic it has created.

Like other natural diseases and disasters, it is a consequence of living in a world populated by people who are failing to look after the world.

Also, Biblical judgments are against specific sins and sinners.

From Pharaoh's obstinacy to Miriam's racial prejudice, to Herod's prideful idolatry, divine judgments of the past and future come to those who refuse God's word and will.

Throughout Scripture and history, God deals with us as gently as he can or as harshly as he must.

No specific sins caused this virus. Nor are those who are afflicted with it more sinful than the rest of us.

God loves the Chinese people just as much as he loves Italians, Koreans, Scandinavians and every other race and nationality.

God loves the elderly and those with pre-existing conditions just as much as he loves the young and the healthy.



One fact this pandemic emphasises, is that we are all part of one race - The Human Race.

And we are all in this together.

While God did not cause this pandemic, neither has he left us to face it alone.

He is with healthcare workers as they risk their lives to care for patients.

He is with grocery workers and delivery drivers as they serve those who can stay safely at home because of their sacrifice.

He is with those who are now unemployed and those who would shelter at home if they had one.

He is with patients who suffer and families who grieve.

As Jesus wept for Lazarus, so he weeps with us and for us.

And God is doing more than hurting with us—he is redeeming this tragedy in amazing ways.

We're seeing an outpouring of unprecedented financial generosity.

We're watching churches and agencies that would never have cooperated a few months ago working together to save lives.

Millions of people around the world are sacrificing their incomes by staying home to protect people they don't know.

In the season of Passover, Jews around the world thank God for their deliverance from Egypt.

During Ramadan, Muslims around the world thank God for the Qur'an.

We Christians observe Good Friday and celebrate Easter as we thank the True and Only God for our Saviour.

Our monotheistic faiths differ in foundational ways, but we share a common belief:

God is with us.

Thoughts

After living for a long time in the beautiful countryside of North Wales close to the seaside, I now live in The North East where evidence of the pits and foundries and forges has now been largely landscaped away.

Hills of black stuff have long been landscaped and we now see fields and hills and playgrounds where previous generations lived out their smoggy industrial lives and livelihoods.

Beautifying a landscape does nothing to wipe out the past and all it represented. Memory of community life and its belonging goes along with the tragedies and losses of industry that was dangerous and costly for many people.

Lives lost and society built are, literally, buried in the seeds that grow the grass on the redeemed hills.

What these lost and broken communities and their landscapes demonstrate, however, is that brokenness can be transformed by beauty.

Ugliness and tragedy need not have the final word.

Time moves on and we transform the landscape in order not to wipe out the past or to devalue previous generations.

Scars bear witness to both the wound and the healing.

New life can come.

This is particularly pertinent now as our way of life seems to be dying, and we now live through a time of Covid uncertainty where we have little or no real idea what the future might hold, or what it might look like for today's younger generation who are at school or university now.

Yet, it is essential, surely, that we hold onto images of hope, of re-creation and a future beauty that will see healing of the scars of the current brutality.

For a personal image on which to hang our hope, we can turn to the encounter of Thomas with the risen Jesus.

Propaganda would have the broken body of the risen Jesus looking beautiful and clean, with all traces of crucifixion horror and suffering removed.

What we get, however, is not some opiate for the people.

Jesus is the same, but different.

Remarkably, he still bears the wound marks of crucifixion in his hands and feet and side.

And Jesus isn't squeamish about inviting Thomas to touch the wounds.



Like the landscaped scars of North East England, our present wounds cannot be romanticised.

But we need to recognise that they can be healed.
