## A letter from Rev John Claydon.

Dear All,

I apologise for writing to you again so soon, but it seemed appropriate to do so following the statement of our Prime Minister and of the new restrictions.

You will notice that corporate worship is still permitted.

Many, if not most of our churches had throughout the autumn began to meet together in person again.

However, even before the announcement of the new restrictions I was already aware of a few that had stopped meeting in person and opted to worship and meet on-line.

We should appreciate the work done by many in our churches in making our buildings Covidsecure and say a big 'thank you' to them.

However, there is increased risk as the new strain of the virus spreads more easily and it is important to note that while we are permitted to meet in worship it does not mean that we have to do so.

We have discovered other ways of being in touch and engaging in worship and to use those means rather than meeting together is not a loss of faith, nor a going back, but a matter of treading this particular path with care, love, respect and honour.

One of the concerns that has been expressed by other regional church leaders in the area is that whilst we work hard to make our church buildings safe our natural inclination for fellowship and conversation before and after times of worship is actually a risk and also not a good witness.

It is good that we feel secure and ok in our buildings, it is not so good that we are then led into a false sense of security that we let our guard down in the way that we interact together.

It is unfortunate to have to say it, but it seems that the best way of sticking and working together is to stay apart.

We have discovered a variety of ways of engaging in worship, fellowship, mission and discipleship and have many good options, including an old-fashioned letter, card or phone card to those not able to use social media.

It is important to be inclusive of all.

So let us use all the options available to us as we seek God's Kingdom and allow Christ to build His Church through us. God bless you!

### **Thoughts - Epiphany**

Epiphany, in the Western church, is celebrated on January 6th, completing the 12 days of Christmas.

Traditionally Epiphany marks the visit of the Magi recorded in Matthew 2:1–12.

(In the Eastern Church, Epiphany is also an observance of the Baptism of Jesus and the revelation of the Trinity.)

The wise men— who were Gentiles from another culture—were people who recognized Jesus' kingship and bowed before him in worship.

Well before Paul's teachings in the Epistles or Peter's vision (Acts 10), this event conveys a truth of great theological significance:

That the gospel is also for the Gentiles and, indeed, for the whole world.

In times before this pernicious and malevolent time of Covid, we decorated our homes and houses, travelled and visited, ate much, opened gifts, and then ate some more.

Then we rang in the New Year with a long list of resolutions and a plate full of mince pies and luscious cakes and drinks.

For a long time now, many people have regarded Epiphany as the time to take down all the decorations and start diets and fitness regimes and even though many people have only heard of Twelfth Night or Epiphany as the deadline for taking down our Christmas decorations, it is actually a highly significant part of Christian history.

The word epiphany means "manifestation" or "revelation."

So, when Christians talk about Epiphany, we are referring to the three wise men's (or the Magi's) revelation that Jesus was the Christ, the Messiah that Israel had been waiting for (Matthew 2:1-12).

On this day, we recognize the wise men's journey to see, worship, and bring gifts to "the one...born king of the Jews" (Matthew 2:2).

The festival commemorating Epiphany is on Jan. 6 and is also sometimes called "Three Kings Day".

So why does the Epiphany matter?

Epiphany celebrates the outward and visible expression of the love of Jesus for us.



Christ's birth was a big deal for the wise men, and it is a big deal for us.

At its essence, Epiphany celebrates Jesus' outward and visible expression of love in leaving His rightful place in heaven to live as a human and become the sacrifice for our sins.

The Magi, aka the wise men, who studied the stars and were considered sinners, represent Jesus' ability to draw all types of people to Him.

He is the Saviour who came for ALL people,

For all mankind, including each one of us.

So why should we celebrate Epiphany? And if so, how?

Epiphany traditions vary from culture to culture, but it can be helpful to remember and celebrate significant events in Jesus' life, including the Epiphany.

When celebrating any holiday, it is important to keep in mind the reason for, and the heart, behind, the celebrations

Rather than just acknowledging traditions or rituals because they've always been done, we need to celebrate the meaning of the holiday: <u>Jesus came to earth to save us!</u>

# **Thoughts – Anti-Covid Vaccines**

The Christian Medical Fellowship (CMF) has warned against people refusing to take a Covid-19 vaccine due to scepticism about the jab.

The warning came after it was announced on Wednesday that the UK has become the first country in the world to approve the Covid-19 vaccine from Pfizer and BioNTech, paving the way for vaccination to start next week.

Some Christians are suspicious about a vaccine, and believe it's a pathway to government control.

Others think the vaccine is the "mark of the beast," and others think that it will diminish their fertility.

But a Californian megachurch pastor, Greg Laurie, addressed the concerns in a sermon and said, "it is interesting... we should not be looking for the anti-Christ, we should be looking for Jesus Christ."

Steve Fouch, from CMF, told Premier that out of all medical technologies, vaccines have had the biggest positive impact on human health.

"They have eliminated some of the most deadly diseases like smallpox," he said. "They have brought under control a lot of other major illnesses that were scourges of the human race for many years. And they have improved the life expectancy of people across the world.

So people often hear half-truths and little stories that make them scared about vaccines. But the reality is, they're the biggest lifesaving medical technology, except possibly clean water, that we have ever developed.

"We have to remember that God enables science and medicine."

The Government has secured 40 million doses of the Pfizer/BioNTech vaccine, with 10,000,000 due in the UK by the end of the year.

Patients need two doses, meaning not enough shots have been secured for the entire UK population.

Work has been going on behind the scenes to ensure that NHS staff are rnow to starting to deliver the "jabs" to the most vulnerable, as well as health and care workers, as a priority.

The NHS Nightingale Hospitals have also been earmarked as sites for mass vaccination clinics - among other uses.

In addition, NHS leaders have said there will be "roving teams" deployed to vaccinate care home residents and workers.

Traditionally vaccines can take years to research and develop, and Fouch said some people are concerned that this vaccine took less than a year.

However, he insisted the safety has not been compromised.

"The way they're doing these trials, because we recognise that we need to get the vaccine quickly, a lot of the safety steps and processes that you would normally go through are happening all at the same time.

So things seem to be happening much quicker than normal, which is interesting, because it shows that when there's the political will and money behind it, we can actually get drugs and medicines through much more quickly than normally happens.

"The same steps have happened. They haven't cut corners on this to get to this point."

His remarks came as the UK Government was warned against the creation of a vaccine passport for people who have had a Covid-19 vaccine.
