In addition, some are shopping for others and helping at the foodbank.

Particularly inspiring is the fact that a large percentage of our membership is over 70, proving the point that age is not a bar to service.

We are also hosting a WhatsApp group, which has been a great source for prayer fuel, and so many answers to prayer have spurred us on.

Regular prayer, fellowship and bible study meetings are also functioning well on Zoom.

A particular prayer focus is that we will remain relevant, so that when the pandemic eases we will be in a position to enable folk to pick up the threads of their lives in a new normal.

A letter from Rev John Claydon

Dear All,

I apologise for writing to you again so soon, but it seemed appropriate to do so following the statement of our Prime Minister and of the new restrictions.

You will notice that corporate worship is still permitted.

Many, if not most of our churches had throughout the autumn began to meet together in person again.

However, even before the announcement of the new restrictions I was already aware of a few that had stopped meeting in person and opted to worship and meet on-line.

We should appreciate the work done by many in our churches in making our buildings Covidsecure and say a big 'thank you' to them.

However, there is increased risk as the new strain of the virus spreads more easily and it is important to note that while we are permitted to meet in worship it does not mean that we have to do so.

We have discovered other ways of being in touch and engaging in worship and to use those means rather than meeting together is not a loss of faith, nor a going back, but a matter of treading this particular path with care, love, respect and honour.

One of the concerns that has been expressed by other regional church leaders in the area is that whilst we work hard to make our church buildings safe our natural inclination for fellowship and conversation before and after times of worship is actually a risk and also not a good witness.

It is good that we feel secure and ok in our buildings, it is not so good that we are then led into a false sense of security that we let our guard down in the way that we interact together.

It is unfortunate to have to say it, but it seems that the best way of sticking and working together is to stay apart.

We have discovered a variety of ways of engaging in worship, fellowship, mission and discipleship and have many good options, including an old-fashioned letter, card or phone card to those not able to use social media.

It is important to be inclusive of all.

So let us use all the options available to us as we seek God's Kingdom and allow Christ to build His Church through us. God bless you!

<u>**2 Corinthians 7 v 10 NIV**</u>: "Godly sorrow produces REPENTANCE leading to salvation not to be regretted."

In Scripture, the word "repentance" means to "turn away from sin", from doing wrong.

By confessing your sin, you acknowledge what you have done; by repenting, you turn away from it; cease from doing it.

Saint Mungo's Day

No doubt you missed it!

I would have too if it weren't for a good friend, Glasgow Gavin, who is associated with BABC.

Saint Mungo is the Patron Saint of Glasgow and also known as Kentigern and who is believed to have been born and brought up in Culross in Fife, though he had many connections with the Welsh St David.

Mungo is believed to have began his Christian Ministry at aged 25 around the year 540.

He established himself in Glasgow living a simple life beside a tributary known as the Molendinar and there, Mungo set up his Church which is the site of Glasgow Cathedral.

Glasgow Cathedral and it is also the burial place for Saint Mungo. His Feast Day is 13th January.



The Glasgow coat of arms shows the life and legend of St Mungo.

- The arms include 'the tree that never grew' relating to St Mungo tending a fire in St Serf's Monastery. He was meant to keep the fire going, but he fell asleep and some lads who were envious of Mungo's favoured position with St Serf, put out the fire while he slept. When Mungo woke he broke off branches from a frozen hazel tree and by praying over them and lit the fire again, the hazel branches were transformed in to a fully grown tree.
- The 'bird that never flew' is about a robin that had been tamed by St Serf and it had been accidently killed. Mungo prayed over the robin and brought it back to life.
- The 'fish that never swam' is about a ring which a King gave to his wife Langoureth who gave it to her lover a knight who wore it and when the King noticed this took it from him when he was sleeping and threw it into the River Clyde. The King then demanded to see the ring from Langeoreth and she confessed this to Mungo who sent a monk to fish the river and found the lost ring inside the fish.
- The bell is attributed to a bell that was reputedly given to Mungo by the Pope on one of Mungo's trips to Rome and was the first bell to hang in the fledgling church.

Given how far in the past St Mungo lived his life, the stories and legends of his time can vary.

Most people remember the symbols depicting his relationship with Glasgow by the following short poem:

There's the tree that never grew, There's the bird that never flew,

There's the fish that never swam, There's the bell that never rang.

Taking the symbols one by one, each refers to a legend during St Mungo's life in Glasgow or his education before he came to found the monastery.

No doubt, you are wondering... "all very interesting, but what's the point?"

The point is that there are many high-profile charities now associated with St Mungo's.

St Mungo's outreach teams go out each night to meet people who are homeless and to help them off the streets.

With 17 outreach teams they are one of the largest providers of outreach services in England.

Each night they offer a bed and support to more than 3,150 people across the south and southwest.



They believe that people can – and do – recover from the issues that cause homelessness.

They work to prevent homelessness and support people at every step of their recovery from homelessness.

Briefly, the services provided include Community Work, Outreach Teams, Providing Accommodation, Assisting to Finding Medical Help, Offender Services, Recovery College, Employment and Employment Support, and a Clearing House helping to get Accommodation for Rough Sleepers.

This is just a short summary, but if you're looking for a worthwhile charity to support, then this is well worth looking up!
