Emmaus

There are all sorts of pilgrimages for which one plans and prepares and looks forward to and anticipates with excitement.

This story in Luke 24:13-35 is nothing like that.

This is a story about a walk that comes from grief and trauma, from profound disappointment and sorrow. It is a story that starts with the slow steps of the depressed and cast down. But it ends with the excited running of the redeemed, and the joy of finding life transformed.

Luke 24 v13-35.

On the road to Emmaus...

...Jesus appears to two disciples, who had been present when Jesus was crucified three days previously in Jerusalem.

This is the longest single post-resurrection narrative in the gospels.



In John's Gospel, Chapter 20, just prior to this encounter described in Luke's Gospel, Jesus appears to Mary of Magdala in the garden outside his burial tomb.

In Luke's account, this appearance of Jesus in the evening of the third day is unique.

Many scholars believe that Luke received the narrative regarding this occurrence from an eye-witness account, and that the narrator was Cleopas, one of the two disciples in the account.

Nowadays, there is also a popular theory that the two disciples may have been man and wife.

Jesus appears mysteriously to the depressed and disillusioned pair as they walk back on the road to their village, Emmaus, on the afternoon of His Resurrection.

This road is approximately 11 kilometres (about 7½ miles) from Jerusalem.

The two disciples walking this road think that Jesus is a pilgrim who must have witnessed Jesus' Death.

During the walk Jesus seems to display an ignorance about the events of the past few days, but He listens intently to their discussion.

The disciples tell him of their shattered hopes and dreams for Jesus, the prophet, who through his great and mighty works and preaching was expected to redeem Israel.

The concept of redemption for these disciples, and for many other Jews too, meant that a conquering, all-powerful Messiah would come and lead them to freedom, but now their idea of redemption had been devastated by the death of Jesus.

They also now believed that the women's story of Jesus' Resurrection (see John 20) was simply an idle tale.

On their walk together, Jesus, still the stranger to the disciples, proceeds to explain through scriptures that in fact the fulfilment of the expectation of the People of God for a Messiah had been accomplished through the Life, Death and Resurrection of Jesus.

Upon arriving at Emmaus, the disciples welcome and invite the stranger, who has now become the companion on the journey, to stay and prepare to have a meal with them.

Jesus accepts their hospitality, and, during their meal takes bread, gives thanks, breaks it and gives it to them.

It is at this moment, as the scriptures have been explained to them, that their hearts burn, they are transformed, and they realise their companion is the Risen Jesus.



It is the message of faith nourished by Jesus, the living bread that many believers take from this narrative. Believers are sustained by faith that Jesus that burns within their hearts.

Christian believers now understand that death does not put an end to one's life.

The essence of this passage is that the Messiah must suffer and die before he enters glory (Luke 24:26).

The death of Jesus, the Messiah, was in keeping with God's purpose.

O LORD, my Father God, please be ever near me as I seek to be your person of character in the middle of the chaos and conflict around me. I ask that your presence be made known and that my character reflects that presence in all that I do and say today, and each day that follows.

In Jesus' name I pray.
