Trinity Sunday – 30th May

Many Christians in the United Kingdom celebrate Trinity Sunday, which is the first Sunday after Pentecost. It is one of the few feasts that are celebrated as a doctrine/principle instead of an event.

It is a symbolic/ representative of the Unity of the Trinity i.e., *God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. Three in One*.

Although the word "trinity" does not appear in Scripture, it is taught in *Matthew 28:18-20* and *2 Corinthians 13:14* (and many other biblical passages).

The concept of the Trinity can never be completely understood or rationalised, but it is clearly taught in Scripture.

An understanding of all scriptural doctrine is by faith, which comes through the work of the Holy Spirit; therefore, it is appropriate that this mystery is celebrated the first Sunday after Pentecost, when the outpouring of the Holy Spirit first occurred.

Today, Trinity Sunday is to explain, to the best of man's ability, the clues written in Scripture to guide us to a fuller understanding of our triune God:

The Father is God from the beginning (John 1:1); Jesus revealed Himself as equal to the Father in John 10:30, *"I and the Father are one."* Together, they sent the Holy Spirit (John 14:26). *"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit"* (Matthew 28:19).

Our own understanding of God.

Some of us may say God is like a Father – providing us with what we need, but maybe with elements of chastising us when we go wrong, keeping us on the straight and narrow path.

Some of us may say God is our Mother – giving birth to us, nurturing us and caring for us.

How careful we have to be here, of stereotypes of mother and father and how different people may have experienced their parents.

Some may say – God is like our brother, sister, friend, companion.

Some may say God is like the wind – we feel God without ever seeing what God is like but know the effect he has on our lives.



Others may use images of a butterfly, a flower, a rainbow, a rock, a stone, a mountain, a thunderstorm, the sea, or fire.

For some it might be sensing God in an early morning sunrise or the quietness of a summers evening. In the smile of a young child or the tenderness of someone we are close to. There may be many simple events that we translate as movements of God's love.

Some may feel comfortable talking about God primarily in terms of Jesus – God's Son. So strong may be their sense of companionship with Jesus that to them God is best expressed through Jesus' language. Others may prefer Holy Spirit language, especially those deeply nurtured in the Pentecostal experience of God.

We cannot package God up into one description. There is always so much to discover about God, we must always keep exploring.

Maybe the Feast of the Holy Trinity can help us to remember the tremendous breadth and depth of God's reality and prevent us from wrapping him up into a tidy package.

It reminds us there are many ways we can relate to and experience God – and that in Christian tradition these ways have for centuries focused on God as Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

We are on a life-long journey of discovery of the God in whose image we are created. We are invited to share in the joy of the God who created us, who saves us, forgives and makes us whole, who strengthens us and leads us into truth.

Let us ask God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, to draw close to us in the coming days and strengthen us in his service. Amen.

Church And Charity Leaders Urge World Politicians To Prioritise Equal Vaccine Distribution.

Several UK faith leaders have called on world leaders to share information and technology to help the global vaccine rollout if they want to avoid a future of *"conflict, insecurity and poverty".*

They write in a letter that "No-one is safe until everyone is safe" and that "equitable vaccine distribution is a humanitarian imperative".

Justin Welby, alongside the executive director of UNICEF and leaders from the Red Cross and others, argues that the effects of Covid-19 will be seen for years to come and that the whole world urgently needs to be vaccinated to limit the negative effects as much as possible.



They write: "The world of the next 10 years can be one of greater justice, abundance and dignity. Or it can be one of conflict, insecurity and poverty."

The charity and faith leaders speak about the poverty that Covid has caused and will cause, with nations facing economic slumps and individuals not being able to afford to send their children to school. They argue that access to healthcare should be drastically improved.

"We need to build a world where each community, regardless of where they live, or who they are, has urgent access to vaccinations: not just for Covid-19, but also for the many other diseases that continue to harm and kill. As the pandemic has shown us, in our interdependent world no one is safe until everyone is safe.". "We have a choice: vaccine nationalism or human solidarity."

The leaders argue that it is in rich countries' own interests to get the world out of coronavirus, saying: "studies show that if we focus only on vaccinating our own populations, the world risks global GDP losses of up to \$9.2 trillion (with half of that cost being incurred by high income countries) this year alone."

They call on world leaders to: "ensure equitable access to vaccines between countries by providing vaccines, sharing knowledge and expertise; to ensure equitable access to vaccines within countries by ensuring all sectors of the population are included in national distribution and vaccination programs, regardless of who they are or where they live, including stigmatised and marginalised communities."

They also urge world leaders to support countries financially, politically and technically, to ensure that stopping Covid-19 is just one important element of a broader strategy to bring longer-term improvements to healthcare.

They end: "It is time for decisive leadership. Countries and organisations across the world have a once-in-a-generation opportunity to address global inequality and reverse some of the fallout from the past year. In doing so, they will bring hope not only for the poorest in the world, but for us all."
