Thoughts

Mercy and Grace

An elegant sunflower stood on its own in the embankment of a lonely stretch of railway, just a few feet away in the waterless rubble and cinders and hard-core.

As we sped past, I wondered how it had grown there with no other sunflowers visible for miles.

Only God could create a plant so hardy it could thrive so close to the track in the uncompromising parched oil covered stones and gravel.

There it was, thriving, waving, in the slipstream, cheerfully greeting travellers as they sped by at 70+ mph.

The Old Testament tells the story of a faithful king of Judah who also showed up unexpectedly. His father and grandfather had enthusiastically served other gods; but after Josiah had been in power for eight years, "while he was still young, he began to seek the God of his father David" (2Chronicles 34:3).

He sent workmen to "repair the temple of the Lord" (v8), and as they did, they discovered the Book of the Law (the first five books of the Old Testament).

God then inspired Josiah to lead the entire nation of Judah to return to the faith of their ancestors, and they served the Lord "as long as [Josiah] lived" (v33).

Our God is the master of unanticipated mercies. He is able to cause great good to spring up unexpectedly out of the unlikely hard rock-strewn and most unlikely, unfavourable, circumstances of life.

Watch Him closely. He may do it again today.

Kindness

BBC Radio 4 got itself interested in Kindness this last week, mainly because some psychologists at some university decided that "kindness" is a basic human trait, associated with "kin", but, as society we don't really know why or how or when etc.

On thinking about it a bit more myself, I decided that we all want to be kind to someone and do something nice and thoughtful for them, either because that's how God designed us, or we do something good to someone because we may have ulterior motives and are earning "Brownie points", wanting something in return eventually.

Definitions often associate the word with being friendly, generous, and considerate. While this may be helpful, these three terms can fail to depict the full nature of what kindness looks like.

Author David Wetherall reveals some of the points the Bible makes about kindness rooted in Christ, which gives the term some needed substance:

 Kindness is Powerful - For we ourselves were once foolish, disobedient, led astray, slaves to various passions and pleasures, passing our days in malice and envy, hated by others, and hating one another. But when the goodness and loving kindness of God our Saviour appeared. (Titus 3:3-4)

Consider what Paul is claiming here - He is saying that we were fools. We did not obey. We followed leaders who took us astray. Not only this but we spent all our time wishing we had what others had and being angry at them for having it. Other people hated us, and we returned the favour. If I met a person like this today, I would likely say, "They are too far gone! Nothing can bring them back to goodness."

Then everything shifts as Paul writes, "But when the goodness and loving kindness of God our Saviour appeared." Just like that, the previous evils are overshadowed by the great mercy of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Kindness, like meekness, gets confused for passivity and ineffectiveness. But the Bible says otherwise—it is the tool of God's omnipotence. Kindness is so powerful; it is even stronger than death!



Kindness Can Hurt - Let a righteous man strike me — it is a kindness (Psalm 141:5)

When I think of actions associated with kindness, I think of "hug," "listen," or "smile." I certainly do not think of the word "strike!" Yet, Psalm 141 unites the two words.

When someone speaks a hard truth into your life, it can hurt. Sometimes it feels like they have betrayed you, like they don't understand you anymore, or like they are looking down on you. In the moment, you can't see why they would say what they did—and it just feels like an aimless, unprompted attack.

And yet, what at first seems like an aimless attack may actually be a compassionate gesture, pushing you back toward fixing your eyes on Christ. Once your eyes are on Him, you can look back and say: "I was in a bad place, and thanks to the kind blows from my friend, I've returned to the peace that comes from Jesus."

• Kindness Brings Honour - Whoever pursues righteousness and kindness will find life, righteousness, and honour. (Proverbs 21:21)

Once again, kindness sometimes carries a connotation of insignificance and failure. Kindness might seem like a nice ideal to some, but if they really want to "make a difference" or "be someone important," then they can't be kind all the time.

First of all, this is not true. As we have already demonstrated, kindness is powerful, and it can change the person you never thought would change.

Secondly, it is slightly true. This world promises certain honours, many of which could be missed by a person who was kind all the time. Yet, as Christians, we are called to strive for a greater honour. We are called to imitate the sufferings of Jesus, which result in an imperishable honour.

There is great honour waiting for those who pursue kindness—for they are passionate for good works for the sake of Jesus Christ.

Don't miss out on this honour by walking in the way of the world.



 Kindness Prepares for Repentance - Or do you presume on the riches of his kindness and forbearance and patience, not knowing that God's kindness is meant to lead you to repentance? (Romans 2:4)

So, kindness has significant power, and its power is not meant to simply make us feel better about ourselves. The power of kindness is seen in how it leads people to repentance.

Remember this next time someone makes you angry. You want them to know how they hurt you, and you want them to never do it again. When I am in this position, I usually use a different instrument than kindness. I may use spite, gossip, or coldness, thinking to myself that kindness will only encourage their behaviour.

This fruit of the Spirit entails forbearance, yet Scripture also tells us that God uses kindness to lead us into repentance.

Why should I use a tool other than the one God chooses to use?
